January Editorial

A very happy New Year to our members and readers!

I started 2018 in Hong Kong, visiting our eldest daughter and family who live there, and then travelled through Vietnam for two weeks.

This is a very interesting and remarkable country that has gone through many wars last century and which now looks to a better future with a reliance on the tourism industry to a fair degree. But what surprised me was the gender balance of roles as I saw more women than men working on construction sites, in the fields (not so unusual) and running businesses. Further, Mother God is a spiritual religion that is worshipped in about 25% of the country, where shrines are very gender equal.

The religion was banned from 1950 to 1990 so there are no ministers or priests. Mother God is prayed to, to help others and not for riches, good fortune or material things. It is the women in the villages who are seen to have special powers to tell fortunes, help others and do good things for their people. Ceremonies are conducted by women and it is these women who are asked for advice and guidance. Religious statures have a female head.

This was all a great surprise to me. I know about the war history yet very little of the sports history of Vietnam. So I am wondering if any of our members know of a woman in Vietnam or more than one woman who we can contact to join IAPESGW and be a part of our international organisation? If so please email me any information I can follow-up.

As a tennis player and fan I have been attending and watching on TV much of the Australian Open Grand Slam. Dane Caroline Wozniacki defeated Simona Halep in the women's final, which was a great match, but all competitors were over shadowed by the amazing Roger Federer who again won the men's singles, his 7th Australian title and his 20th grand slam. He is an extraordinary player and human being who so perfectly displays the values of sport.

Some sad news is that the South Korean Olympic Committee has dumped some of its women's ice hockey team to fit in competitors from North Korea so that there is an offering of international neutrality and peace through Olympic sport at the PyeongChong Winter Olympics and Paralympics next month. The women's team has to accept the North Korean players into it and so dump some of its player's only weeks out from the Olympics while not requiring the same of the men's team. This is clearly sex discrimination and not gender equality as preached by the Olympic movement.

This Update covers international conferences and of note is the first Safe Sport Conference in Madrid April 6-7, 2018. We list new publications of interest and some recent research into women's participation conducted in Malaysia by Clare Hanlon who was one of our keynote speakers in Miami.

It covers the Billie Jean King – Briggs tennis match in 1973 – which was the most watched event that year around the world – and tells her story of fighting for gender equality on the tennis circuit and her search for sexual freedom. And Billie Jean King presented the winner's trophy to Caroline Wozniacki last Saturday!

Safe Sport International Conference on Challenging Violence in Sport Friday, April 6, 2018 and Saturday, April 7, 2018, Madrid, Spain

There has been a recent and rapid growth in awareness among sports federations, scientists and athlete advocates of the damaging personal and organisational impacts of violence (harassment and abuse) to athletes, and an increasing recognition that violence threatens not only the ethical and social basis of sport but also the physical, emotional and mental health of the athlete. Rights violations of concern include: sexual, physical, psychological abuse and neglect.

Safe Sport International (SSI) seeks to end violence and abuse against athletes and feels that the time is right for a coordinated international effort to prevent and respond to this violence as part of the global effort to uphold and protect the sporting values that we all cherish.

Safe Sport International (SSI) is holding its inaugural conference in Madrid, April 6th-7th to address research evidence, policy responses, preventive strategies and the growing demand for safe sport practice to secure sport as a place of safety for all athletes.

IOC President Bach grants World Taekwondo Women and Sport achievement diploma International Olympic Committee (IOC) President Thomas Bach has granted World Taekwondo a "Women and Sport" achievement diploma in recognition of its outstanding contribution to promoting the development and participation of women and girls in sport.

World Taekwondo made specific efforts for gender equality at last year's Olympic Games in Rio de Janeiro.

In addition to the 50/50 split in taekwondo's competitive categories, with four female and four male weight categories, World Taekwondo, for the first time, has a 50/50 gender split in its contingent of international referees.

They are also promoting a new category in its annual Team Championships with a mixedgender team. The format was experimented with alongside the existing female team and male team formats at last year's World Taekwondo Team Championships in Baku.

More recently it was contested on the regular programme at the 2017 World Team Championships in Abidjan in the Ivory Coast.

Exclusive: IOC member voices concerns about Pan-Korean ice hockey team at Pyeongchang 2018

International Olympic Committee (IOC) Athletes' Commission member Hayley Wickenheiser has raised concerns about how the Pan-Korean ice hockey team at next month's Winter Olympics in Pyeongchang disregards principles of gender equality.

There is also criticism in South Korea about the decision.

An online petition urging the Government not to form the joint team has now reportedly received over 40,000 signatures.

Under the plans, which were confirmed following a meeting yesterday in Lausanne chaired by International Olympic Committee (IOC) and involving North and South Korean delegations, 12 players from the North will participate alongside 23 from the South.

A squad of 22 of the 35 players will feature in each game, with at least three of these having to be North Korean.

They will compete under the name "Korea", with the unification flag displayed.

Wickenheiser, a four-time Olympic ice hockey gold medallist for Canada elected to the IOC Athletes' Commission in 2014, did not dispute that there are benefits to the idea.

"From a global world peace perspective if the two countries can broker peace through these talks and the composition of the women's team, then great," she told insidethegames today.

"My only issue is having the South Korean women's team make this last-minute alteration to

their team composition, but not requiring the same of the men, is clearly not an example of promoting/supporting gender equality in the Olympic Movement."

This week, It's a Penalty have announced the launch of their 2018 Global Child Protection Campaign. This year, they plan to use an incredibly packed international sporting calendar to deliver a four-pronged approach to protect children on a global scale.

It's a Penalty will be working together with A21, Comic Relief, The McCain Institute, Sysdoc, World Vision, the Carlson Rezidor hotel group, ICMEC, sporting governing bodies and law enforcers to deliver the preventative campaign. Their partners and supporters will come together to ask the world to take a stand against child abuse, exploitation and trafficking.

It will be focused around four major sporting events, which include: the Super Bowl LII (Minneapolis, USA) - 4th February 2018; PyeongChang Winter Olympics & Paralympics (South Korea) - 9th-25th February & 9th-18th March 2018; Hong Kong Rugby Sevens - 6th-8th April 2018; and finally the Gold Coast Commonwealth Games (Australia) - 4th-15th April 2018.

They are positioning these major sporting events as platforms for positive change across all societies by EDUCATING about the issues and penalties for offenders, EQUIPPING and ENCOURAGING the general public to #knowthesigns and to take action - 'if you see something, say something!'

Healthy people, healthy planet: The role of health systems in promoting healthier lifestyles and a greener future. Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development, November 2017 (24 pages)

As the G7 economies continue their recovery from the Great Recession, the stress on their environmental resources is likely to grow, unless appropriate policy measures are taken. Air pollution, an important source of environmental stress, affects health outcomes directly, for example as a risk factor for respiratory and cardiovascular conditions, or indirectly, such as through the impacts on climate change and higher probability of extreme weather events. Many sources contribute to environmental pollution, including the overconsumption of food, unhealthy diets and food waste, unsustainable city growth, as well as overreliance on private motorised vehicles as a means of transportation. Each of these factors can also have a direct negative effect on various dimensions of health.

This document, produced to inform the 2017 meeting of the G7 Ministers of Health, provides a broad overview of the main policy issues and some of the policy actions that G7 Health authorities can put in place to improve population health, while at the same time decreasing the human footprint on the environment.

Policy Recommendations:

- Support the development and implementation of nutritional guidelines promoting healthier food consumption – as this can lead to less stress on the environmental resources used in food production – as well as reduce the environmental footprint in hospitals and in nursing homes by encouraging healthier food consumption, waste reduction and cleaner energy generation;
- Create partnerships with various national and local stakeholders, including local city authorities and ministries of industry, environment, transport, and agriculture, in order to incorporate health and environmental considerations into urban planning schemes;
- Implement public health actions encouraging more physical activity and greater reliance on active modes of transportation, such as through physical activitypromoting mass media campaigns, bike sharing schemes and creating lowemission zones.

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How does the time children spend using digital technology impact their mental well-being, social relationships and physical activity? An evidence-focused literature review [Paper]. Daniel Kardefelt Winther, UNICEF, December 2017 (35 pages)
Based on an evidence-focused literature review, the first part of this paper examines existing knowledge on how the time children spend using digital technology impacts their well-being across three dimensions; mental/psychological, social and physical. The evidence reviewed here is largely inconclusive with respect to impact on children's physical activity, but indicates that digital technology seems to be beneficial for children's social relationships. In

terms of impact on children's mental well-being, the most robust studies suggest that the relationship is U-shaped, where no use and excessive use can have a small negative impact on mental well-being, while moderate use can have a small positive impact. In the second part of the paper, the hypothetical idea of addiction to technology is introduced and scrutinized. This is followed by an overview of the hypothetical idea that digital technology might re-wire or hijack children's brains; an assumption that is challenged by recent neuroscience evidence. In conclusion, considerable methodological limitations exist across the spectrum of research on the impact of digital technology on child well-being, including the majority of the studies on time use reviewed here, and those studies concerned with clinical or brain impacts. This prompts reconsideration of how research in this area is conducted. Finally, recommendations for strengthening research practices are offered.

Beyond Sport reports (15 January 2018)

New rugby union CBA introduces pay parity for Australia women's team

Rugby Australia have struck a new collective bargaining agreement that will see the women's rugby union team paid for Test matches for the first time, and women's and men's sevens and Super Rugby starters receive the same base pay.

An entry level salary of \$44,500 has been mandated across these formats, while the agreement will last until the expiry of the current broadcast deal in 2020.

Top-level salaries will still be disparate between men's XVs and others, but the move is a significant improvement for the women's game. Women will also have a new pregnancy policy built into the agreement, which lasts until the expiry of the 2020 broadcast deal.

The deal follows Raelene Castle's December appointment as chief executive of RA, where she acknowledged that the "female market is really hot" and that rugby union was in a "race ... to be a sport of choice" for women.

Sevens co-captain Shannon Parry heralded the pregnancy policy as a significant breakthrough for women playing rugby union.

CHINA

Inside the games reports (4 January 2018) Song elected secretary general of Chinese Olympic Committee

Song Keqin has been elected secretary general of the Chinese Olympic Committee (COC) at the organisation's Plenary Meeting in Beijing.

Song Luzeng was elected to the position of vice-president at the meeting. Keqin replaces Song Luzeng as the secretary general.

She will serve under the leadership of COC President Gou Zhongwen.

"We look forward to your continuous support and cooperation," Song said in a letter to Olympic Council of Asia director general Husain Al-Musallam informing him of the election results.

Song was previously a deputy to Song Luzeng but has now taken on the main role following her election at the meeting in the Chinese capital.

Abstract

The majority of research on factors associated with women participation in physical activity (PA) has been in developed countries with limited research in developing countries. Few women in Malaysia are active at the recommended levels for health, and activity rates are less than developed countries. Little research has focused specially on physically active Malaysian women and the factors that contribute to them becoming and staying active in PA

programs. This lack of knowledge hinders the tailored development and implementation of PA programs to meet their needs.

The aim of this study was to identify the factors of participation in PA programs for Malaysian women. The social-ecological model was used to investigate and theme the factors. Focus group discussion was conducted with participants in six PA programs targeted specifically to women. Thirty-seven women were involved in the focus group discussion, with ages ranging from 19 to 82 years. Inductive and deductive content analysis was conducted from verbatim transcripts using NVivo. Inductive content analysis allowed raw data and second-order themes to emerge.

Findings revealed social support structures, tailored programs for women, and location were key contributors that encouraged women to participate in these programs. The similarity in contributors between women in non-western and western countries signifies a prime opportunity for bi-lateral relationships to be formed to enable the enhancement of program development relevant to different ethnicities and cultures within or across countries.

SOUTH AFRICA

Inside the games reports (9 January 2018) Reddy sacked as South African Sports Confederation and Olympic Committee chief executive

Tubby Reddy has been sacked as chief executive of the South African Sports Confederation and Olympic Committee (SASCOC) after a lengthy disciplinary process. Reddy was suspended by the organisation last July, after SASCOC launched an investigation into allegations of sexual misconduct.

The investigation centered around claims that he sent pornographic material to female colleagues.

It was also claimed that he failed to follow proper labour practice when he appointed a company to investigate SASCOC staff.

Official confirmation from SASCOC is expected to be released later today, but local reports have stated seven of their 14 council members voted in favour of the dismissal.

Spanish Olympic Committee establish Women and Gender Equality Commission

A Women and Gender Equality Commission has been established by the Spanish Olympic
Committee (COE) and held its first meeting of the Tokyo 2020 cycle.

During the first gathering of the Commission, chaired by COE vice-president Isabel García, the group "laid the foundations" for development projects which will be initiated during the next two years.

Garcia, the President of the Spanish Salvage and Lifeguard Federation, and secretary Victoria Cabezas, who also serves as the general secretary of the COE, were among the attendees at the meeting.

A brief study that reflects the current situation in terms of equality between men and women in the field of sport is among the first items planned for this year, according to the COE.

Women's Sport Trust (14 December 2017) Statement on the use of Grid Girls in sport

The Women's Sport Trust believes women in the sporting environment should be judged by their sports appeal and not sex appeal. We've been working with Getty to establish visual standards for the depiction of sportswomen which focus less on what women look like and more on what they achieve.

At a time when so much great work is being done to raise the visibility and increase the impact of women's sporting role models, it's disappointing to see that some of the highest profile international sporting events such as motor racing, cycling and boxing, still choose to use women to accessorise their events rather than be a central part of a sport.

What sort of message are we sending women and girls about how they are valued? We're asking them to look and admire the successful, talented, strong men taking part in the competition, whilst the role of the women is purely based on their physical appearance.

University of Manchester (15 December 2017) Women's football has a long way to go, report finds

Women's football is undergoing a period of dramatic growth and development, but the largest and most far-reaching report into working conditions in the game has found that female footballers still lack the same securities as men, with contracts, employment security and prize money among the problem areas.

A survey commissioned by FIFPro - the international professional football players' union - was completed by over 3000 players from the top women's leagues in 33 nations across the world. This covered issues ranging from age, education and salary, to contracts, payments and expenses.

It also gathered data about the longer-term experiences of female footballers throughout their careers on issues such as childcare, discrimination, abuse, violence and match fixing.

The data from the survey was analysed by a team at The University of Manchester, led by Dr Aristea Koukiadaki and Dr Geoff Pearson - who were also the authors of the 2016 Report into the working conditions in the men's game.

Their findings have revealed that almost 50% of female football players surveyed lacked a written contract, and half did not receive any income whatsoever from their club. Even where players did possess a contract, this was usually less than two years in length, giving them little employment security.

Leeds Beckett University (18 December 2017) Media representations of female athletes undermine their success

Female athletes continue to be undermined by the media who portray them as smiley, maternal and non-threatening, and downplay their sporting prowess, according to new research from Leeds Beckett University.

Representations of successful female athletes are contradictory: their athletic achievements are frequently praised while their prowess is consistently undermined through questioning their performance, level of competition, and the value of their sport, and by focusing on their roles as women outside of their careers.

Dr Katherine (Kate) Dashper, Reader in the School of Events, Tourism and Hospitality Management at Leeds Beckett, examined the representation of three well-known female athletes achieving high visibility in the British print press during the 2016 Olympic Games: Nicola Adams (boxing), Charlotte Dujardin (dressage) and Jessica Ennis-Hill (heptathlon).

Kate explained: "Female athleticism continues to be framed as less important, exciting and worthy than men's – for example, by consistently using the prefix 'women's'. Reporting is often

lacklustre, downplaying technical skill and foregrounding factors such as hard work, luck and the role of others in a woman's successes. It is only during major events like the Olympic Games that women get much media attention at all.

Kick It Out CEO Roisin Wood statement in response to FA letter on Phil Neville appointment

Following the publication of a letter written by The Football Association today (24 January), in response to a statement regarding Phil Neville's appointment from Roisin Wood, CEO of Kick It Out, she has issued the following statement.

Roisin Wood, CEO of Kick It Out, said:

"We welcome The FA's full account of the process they used to identify suitable candidates for consideration for the appointment of Head Coach of the England Women's Senior Team.

"In doing so, The FA has shown it is willing to be open, accountable and provide explanations. We hope that this new openness will be a feature of a changing culture.

"However, there are still outstanding concerns about how the final decision was made to appoint Phil Neville, once the initial process was unsuccessful following the withdrawal of several candidates.

"It is difficult to accept that there were no BAME qualified candidates who could have been considered for the position in the same way Neville was, who did not apply. For an organisation that wants to put women's football high up on its agenda, it is equally hard to accept that The FA could not find one qualified woman who could have filled this position.

"The FA may also have created a problem for itself in what appears to be double standards regarding the threshold for what social media posts are considered discriminatory. They may find it difficult or even impossible to bring charges against those under investigation presently, or in future.

"The people involved in football who have raised their concerns about The FA's commitment to equality, diversity and inclusion, following the decision to appoint Phil Neville, will have to make their own judgements about The FA's explanations."

Nassar sentenced to up to 175 years in prison for criminal sexual abuse

Disgraced former USA Gymnastics team doctor Larry Nassar has been sentenced to 40 to 175 years in prison on seven counts of criminal sexual abuse.

In delivering her verdict at the courthouse in Lansing in Michigan, Judge Rosemarie Aquilina said she had just signed Nassar's "death warrant".

Nassar was sentenced following an emotional hearing, where 156 girls and women accused him of abuse.

"It is my honour to sentence you because, sir, you do not deserve to walk outside of a prison ever again," Judge Aquilina said.

"Anywhere you walk, destruction would occur to those most vulnerable.

"I just signed your death warrant."

Nassar had pleaded guilty to the seven counts brought against him in Ingham County in November.
